

Life is messy, life is complicated, but if we are open to the Holy Spirit, wonderful things can happen.

My life has had many ups and downs, and I've faced numerous challenging adventures where I wasn't sure I could make it. However, in reflection, I realize that God always sent someone to help me navigate the new terrain. I was terrified when I was first diagnosed with Non-Hodgkin Lymphoma in 2016. I had two teaching jobs: educating students in the morning and teaching their parents ESL two nights a week. I was also taking care of my mom, my boys, Wesley and Trevor, and my husband Eric.

It was a balancing act, but I quickly learned that I couldn't do it all by myself. I learned to lean on others, and the Holy Spirit definitely provided the help I needed. I decided I needed to make changes and turn unhappy things into joyful ones. Losing my hair was devastating, but I discovered I could wear wigs in every color, which made me smile and made others feel more at ease with me. I had many styles in purple, red, blonde, brown, and rainbow. It made getting dressed a game.

Fast forward four years, and I had a relapse in April 2020, right when COVID started. Again, I knew my treatment options were slim. My doctor arranged with Vanderbilt University Medical Center to have a stem cell transplant. Unfortunately, my body did not respond appropriately to qualify for treatment. I was devastated, but the next day, my doctor called - I was eligible for a CAR-T transplant, which turned out to be even better. God opened up so many doors for me, and everything fell into place. I qualified for the treatment. We found a place to live in Nashville for the required six-week duration, and the hospital had just reopened its program after closing it down for COVID. The kindness of people overwhelmed me with food, finances, friendships, and especially their prayers. They were all the hands and feet of Jesus.

The hands and feet of Jesus allowed me to flourish. I have so much gratitude in my heart that I daily ask God to use me as his hands and feet wherever I go. It can just be a kind word, a smile, or a listening ear to comfort. I pray for God to use me and to put me where I need to be to help others. I share the light of Jesus wherever I can, and I am blessed that I can be joyful and share with others in their need.

Prayer

God, use me as your hands and feet and take me out of my comfort zone as needed.

There's a quiet tension many of us feel when it comes to giving: not from unwillingness, but from uncertainty. You want to support the church, to be generous, to respond to God's goodness—but the question lingers: How much is right?

This isn't just a financial decision—it's a spiritual one. Giving is less about the amount and more about alignment. It's about tuning your heart to God's voice and letting that guide your hand. In my own life, God has provided me with material blessings beyond what I could ask or think. I have been laid off from a job three times, and each time the Lord has provided for me. The first time, I had a young family with a wife and two small children. I ended up getting a large severance package, and I found a new job right away. Isn't it just like our God to give us experiences like these?! (By the way, this third layoff led to a tremendously rewarding job that I retired from last year after more than 10 years with the company.)

These experiences (and many others) have shown me that one of the best ways to go about our daily lives is with an attitude of thankfulness. Coming from a place of gratitude gives us that "glass half full" perspective. It allows us to see the best in people and in situations, even when they may not appear that good on the surface. It helps us stay open to the possibilities that may be hidden by the current problems. It encourages us to show gratitude for our own blessings by being a blessing to others.

Prayer

Dear Heavenly Father, Thank you for blessing us in so many ways. From the human perspective, so much of what we do, say, or think would seem to make us unworthy of your love. But thankfully, that's not how you work. You show us grace and mercy that we do not deserve. You give us endless opportunities to get it right, to try to live better lives, and try to make the world you created a better place. You are an amazing God, whose love for us is beyond comprehension. Amen

"I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." – Philippians 4:13

"Finally, my brother, be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might. Put on the whole armor of God, that you may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of his age, against spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places. Therefor take up the whole armor of God, that you may be able to withstand the evil day, and having done all, to stand." – Ephesians 6:10

At times, my life has felt very out of control. Recently it was the loss of my mom, who I loved with all my heart. Then watching those I love suffer this loss with no ability to take their pain away. How could I help, what could I do, where do I start? My mind tends to spin around and around, over and over, trying to come up with solutions or ways to take control and help those close to my heart. The Bible tells us we are not in control, so how do we manage pain, anxiety, worry and fear? I had to step out of my overwhelming feelings and ask God every day to show me a path, His path, not mine. Two verses kept coming to mind, verses I had used before when faced with overwhelming fear.

The Philippians verse focuses on the God-given power to endure any circumstance. You have to wonder, would we talk to God if we never faced difficult circumstances? It gives a reason for suffering, if nothing more than to force us to pour out our hearts to the only One that can help. Suffering is a double-edged sword, which brings us to the second verse.

I grew up in a stable middle class home with two caring, hard-working parents. We had what we needed, but not a lot extra. Sadly, one thing we did have was a level of uneasiness—my father was consumed with the bad news of the day, and back then, he got that from the morning and evening papers which were delivered daily, and of course, the nightly news when everyone had to be silent in the living room. We didn't suffer, but I really can't recall many smiles on his face as we grew up. My father died when my children were young. I thought then about how little joy I witnessed in his life and it affected me. We were a good family living in a safe place, and it seemed he was never able to enjoy how lucky we were.

Looking at the words of Philippians above—how many times a day do we scroll through things that are completely not noble, not reputable, not beautiful? We need to continually dwell on and thank God for the things we DO have, and not be consumed by the desire for more. Of course, it is human to get used to our everyday luxuries and begin to take them for granted, but stopping to give a quick prayer of thanks throughout the day truly helps to adjust my perspective. As I've gotten older, I really have learned to stop, notice, and appreciate. We all need to take the time to do that.

"My days fly faster than a weaver's shuttle. They end without hope. O God, remember that my life is but a breath, and I will never again feel happiness. You see me now, but not for long. You will look for me, but I will be gone." – Job 7:6-10

Have you ever felt like you have no more to give and you have done everything you can to make it better, and still feel hopeless and empty?

When my father passed, it was devastating for our whole family. He was diagnosed with a deadly cancer that gave him six months to live. Being in and out of the hospital caring for him, I could see him being hopeful that something miraculous would happen and he would get better, but unfortunately that did not happen. His health declined, but seeing him so full of hope gave us all hope that he would get better. My father passed January of 2017.

While we were all still mourning my dad's passing, something hopeful happened. My husband and I had tried to get pregnant for some time and had a miscarriage before, and this time I was pregnant. It seemed like there was finally a ray of light shining through those dark clouds. We made it through the whole pregnancy and had our precious baby boy Cassius. He was perfect and everything we ever wanted. Cassius was so loved. He made it seem less sad that my father was gone and kept my mind busy. Six months after having Cassius, I was pregnant again with our second baby, Callie Jo. She was a perfect little angel and her brother absolutely loved her. This was until December 23, 2018 – the worst day of our lives. He was taken from us when he was 15 months old. We were so shocked because we never thought in a million years this could happen to us.

I asked God: why us? Why him? No answer. I was so hopeless and broken. I didn't know what to do. I felt nothing could help us now. My cry for help was there. but nothing was happening.

This was until a great friend from church continued to check up on us. Jerry Ma has helped me become the person I needed to become to make it out alive. Her support and faithfulness really helped me become a better version of myself with God in my life. I continued to go to church to try and hear God talk to me and give me a reason as to why this happened to us.

At the time I was hopeless and empty, God was still there. Where I could have turned from my faith and blame God for what had happened, I refocused myself to find God and try to heal and stop focusing on the what-ifs. God has His way of doing things and it's His timing, not ours. We as Christians need to trust in Him and believe there is a deeper reasoning as to why things happen. We won't always have the answers, but it's all part of His plan. Now five years later, our family is stronger in our faith than we have ever been. We are living proof that God heals and makes us stronger in faith.

Today take time to reflect on what's making you feel hopeless or weighing you down and release that negative energy.

In the last several months, I have become obsessed with bees and beekeeping. I have spent a ton of time reading and watching YouTube videos on bees, becoming more knowledgeable about beehive life, and certainly more aware of how important bees are to our planet—pollinating 75% of flowering plants. Thanks to bee pollination, plants can reproduce and provide food for the planet. A vibrant and healthy hive can have as many as 40,000 bees, all working to together to produce hundreds of pounds of honey a year.

In similar fashion, we as believers and members of CUMC, empowered by God, contribute our gifts and talents to nurture a vibrant and fruitful fellowship. We are working together to produce spiritual "honey" that feeds our members.

Bees are hard workers, completing their tasks diligently and faithfully returning to their hive. Their lives – on average 62 days – are just like the ants in Proverbs 6:6-8. The church, like the hive, flourishes when each member serves with humility and devotion. In beekeeping and in the church, "honey" flows when the members work together.

One more fun fact about bees: Did you know that bees communicate with each other through a "waggle dance"? This dance helps them share information about the direction and distance to sources of food. It's like their own little GPS system! As in Psalm 149:3, the bees seem to know that we are all to "praise his name with dancing" as this is how they share news of the bounty they discover.

I have taken solace as I age in the above verse revealing another meaning to me----Christ also gives me strength in uncertainty, not just the accomplishment of what I believe should be done. "The Lord is close to the brokenhearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit." – Psalm 34:18

"Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God." – 2 Corinthians 1:3-4

I have seen the church in action. If the church is supposed to be the hands and feet of Christ, I have been embraced and held up by those hands and I have been pursued by those feet.

There is no easy way to put to words the loss I have experienced alongside my family in recent years. This list will convey plot events, but not the meaning of it: My sister died in 2021 at 39 years old. Five months later, my mother suddenly collapsed and never recovered. By 2023, my family and I were just picking up the pieces of our lives when my dad was diagnosed with cancer, and after a few months of chemo, he died in his sleep. One year and two months later, my nephew succumbed to grief and mental illness and took his own life.

I share the gravity of these deaths to share this now: I would not have survived this period of grief if not for the church. Our pastors were among my very first phone calls each time I learned that my world changed forever again. I knew I was dialing a lifeline. I knew they would pray with me in that moment and continue to pray for me and my family. They moved into action by helping plan memorials, lifting the burden of executive function off of my freshly frazzled brain as much as they could. At the services, people I barely knew came together to run sound, perform powerful songs of hope, and serve food, making what could be the worst days of my life into moments that I can look back on proudly, knowing they honored my loved ones.

In the dark days that followed, members of my small group brought food for me, my children and visiting family members. It meant so much to let go of worry for just one thing each time someone would make those dinners. Intense grief and trauma wears on you, changing you into someone who survives each day instead of proactively taking it in. Our Sunday school friends did things like fix our porch and mow the lawn, to cover us when we just couldn't take as good of care of ourselves as we had before the impact of loss.

This past year, I was asked to help facilitate a Grief Share group here at church. I was able to find some amount of purpose in my pain and hopefully help others in their own. This church—God working through it—brought me from brokenhearted to comforting others as I have been comforted. Playing whatever role we can in helping those that need it most is what I think it means to be the church.

Prayer

Lord, thank you for being one that draws near to the brokenhearted and the one to sit with us in our pain. Let me comfort others as I can through your words and guidance from the Holy Spirit. Amen.

A Closing Thought

These 21 days has shown us that together, WE are the Church! Each devotion, prayer and story serves as a reminder that God's love and faithfulness reaches every part of our lives.

Even though the devotional ends here, the journey doesn't. "I Am the Church" means encouraging one another and living out the love God has for us each and every day.
